**Joint Resolution
of the Salt Lake City Council,
Mayor Rocky Anderson, the Salt Lake County Council,
and Mayor Peter M. Corroon
Concerning the Salt Palace Expansion and Japan Town**

WHEREAS, prior to 1967, there was a viable and thriving Japanese community, known as Japan Town, located on First South between Main Street and Third West and adjacent streets which had its beginning at the turn of the century;

WHEREAS, much of Japan Town was demolished in the process of building the original SPCC in 1967;

WHEREAS, the two remaining pillars of the Japanese community in what remains of Japan Town, the Japanese Church of Christ (JCC) and the Salt Lake Buddhist Temple (Temple), have existed on First South for over eighty years;

WHEREAS, Japan Town has been a tremendous cultural asset that adds history, diversity, and vitality to Salt Lake City and Salt Lake County;

WHEREAS, the proposed expansion of the SPCC may negatively impact Japan Town unless effective efforts are undertaken to support and revive Japan Town;

WHEREAS, Japan Town hosts cultural gatherings and festivals important to the Japanese-American community and others;

WHEREAS, the Japanese-American community has made important contributions to the cultural, economic and societal well-being of Salt Lake City and Salt Lake County;

WHEREAS, the SPCC staff, representatives of the Salt Lake County Council and their staff, representatives of the Salt Lake City Council and their staff, Salt Lake City Mayor Rocky Anderson and his staff, and the Japanese Community Preservations Committee, Inc. (JCPC) have worked diligently and conscientiously in attempting to resolve the issue of the proposed SPCC expansion and any negative impact on the JCC, the Temple, and the Japanese community at large and its culture and heritage;

WHEREAS, the desire of the Japanese-American community to retain a sense of place is a significant value for Salt Lake City and Salt Lake County; and

WHEREAS, the cultural preservation of Japan Town is important to the development of diverse ethnic neighborhoods along 300 West.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Salt Lake City Council, the Mayor of Salt Lake City, the Salt Lake County Council, and the Mayor of Salt Lake County shall strive to honor the Japanese-American community and recognize the positive impacts for the entire community that will result from the support and expansion of Japan Town by effectively working to promote cultural preservation and revitalize Japan Town. Such efforts may include the purchase or exchange of land to accommodate the revitalization of Japan Town, the dedication of public space for a public plaza in conjunction with Japan Town, and providing assistance to businesses or residents that desire to locate or expand in Japan Town;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the JCPC commits to assist in bringing businesses, institutions, and resources to assist in establishing a Japanese Cultural Corridor; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all parties concerned shall work cooperatively, diligently and in good faith to effectuate the letter and spirit of this Resolution.

GRANT DETAILS:

- YouthCity Government in cooperation with eight community partners is mounting a Day of Service on January 17, 2005, Martin Luther King Jr. Day. Activities include a community food drive and at least 200 volunteers delivering food boxes and hygiene kits to 300 older adults who are from low income neighborhoods or who have disabilities. In addition, YouthCity Government students are collecting 30 oral histories from older adults for whom civil rights have impacted their life in the community. The students will present the oral histories to the Salt Lake City Council in April 2005 in their state of the city address.
- The required match of at least \$11,677 is supplied through the in-kind donation of 300 food boxes valued at \$60 each (\$18,000) from the Utah Food Bank, an in-kind donation of 300 hygiene kits valued at \$30 each (\$9,000) from Alliance for Unity, and a grant of \$500 from the Constitutional Rights Foundation that was awarded to Salt Lake City Foundation for the project.

GRANT DETAILS:

The Salt Lake City Methamphetamine Initiative has been funded by COPS Office since 1998. The original award was \$750,000, and since that time we have received two supplemental awards of \$125,000 and \$295,000. This is a third supplemental request.

The purpose of the funding is to continue efforts to abate clandestine drug labs in Salt Lake City, attack the issue of the transportation of methamphetamine from Mexico to Utah, decrease the number of treatment admissions for meth addiction, and to attack the issue of meth use by pregnant women and young mothers.

Funding will be used to purchase computer video equipment, training materials, media campaign posters and banners, training for Narcotics officers and Meth Initiative Personnel, and overtime personnel in training transportation officials on identifying drug trafficking.
